
It was a great effort as there were more than 100 hours of community service donated to Locust Grove over the course of the two days. We hope this successful venture will lead to continued community partnership.

Proceeds from the sale of the Bargain Box have been allocated to establish a chapter of Imagination Library with the Junior League of Poughkeepsie as one of our core programs.

Imagination Library is a non-profit organization founded by Dolly Parton (Dollywood Foundation), that is focused on developing early childhood literacy, prior to children entering kindergarten. Each month from birth until a child reaches his/her fifth birthday, Imagination Library will send them a free age-appropriate book that is selected by a committee of teachers, child development specialists, and librarians. The program encourages both literacy and parent-child interactions.

JLP has set aside \$6,000 to fund this endeavor and a committee has been formed to seek additional funds through grants, fundraisers and community support.



On May 12-14, 2016, Cammie Jones (President-Elect) and Catherine Larkin (Membership Co-Chair) would attend The Association of Junior Leagues International 94 th Annual Conference in Atlanta Georgia! This year's conference focused on leagues being "All In" and addressing how league can make a difference in their communities with their programming and outreach. The keynote address would come from Carlotta Walls Lanier, a civil rights pioneer who was a part of The Little Rock Nine, a group of African-American students who, in 1957, were the first black students ever to attend classes at Little Rock Central High School in Little Rock, Arkansas. She was the first black female to graduate from Central High School. Her keynote address focused on the importance of answering to social justice issues within one's community and leading the torch for community change, a theme that would take part in most workshops throughout the conference. 239 leagues were present at the annual conference and participants were given the opportunity to attend sessions that focused on diversity and inclusion, achieving community impact goals, parliamentary procedures, marketing and branding, governance and policy, membership management and much more. The conference was truly an inspiring and empowering experience for both Cammie and Catherine. Lessons learned from the conference in regards to community impact, branding, membership management and diversity and inclusion will definitely be focus areas implemented within our league for the next upcoming years of service!
